



### **Holiday Shores Snow & Ice Procedures**

Snow plowing and ice control begins when there is two inches of snow and more is expected or when ice begins to make the roads hazardous. Ice control material is applied to locations on an "as needed" basis. It takes 4-5 hours to plow the entire community with only two inches of snow. Salt will be used sparingly this year due to increased costs. Please be careful.

### DO NOT CALL THE OFFICE TO SEE IF THE SNOW PLOWS ARE OUT OR TO REPORT SNOW. PLEASE BE PATIENT.

#### **PRIORITY 1 ROADS**

Cedar Lane, Shore Dr, Holiday Dr, Elm, Blvd De Cannes, Newport Bay, Holiday Point Pkwy, Carribean, Biscay, Waikiki, Castle, High Point, Su Twan, Fountainbleu, Treasure, Tamarach, Overlook and Birch.

### What cautions should I be aware of?

Do not park on the road during the snow removal process. Do not push snow onto the roadway! This creates a very hazardous condition.

### What about driveways?

Maintenance personnel are not authorized to plow driveways and plows will not be lifted at the entrance to each individual driveway. Clearance of driveway entrances is the responsibility of the resident. Plows may make several passes in order to widen the roads.

### What about mailboxes?

The truck will get as close to the mailboxes as possible. It is the homeowner's responsibility to keep the area in front of the mailbox cleared. Keep mailboxes closed at all times.

### What about trashcans on pick up days?

Trashcans and recycle containers must be 4' off the road. The snowplow drivers will not get out to move your containers and will not be responsible for damage.

### **USE CAUTION!**

When maintenance is out on the roads, stay a safe distance behind the trucks. If you cannot see the mirrors on the trucks, they will not be able to see you.


### Manager's Report by Rob Clarkson

Our lake is at full pool due to the recent rains. With 2020 being a draw down year we ask all Lake front property owners to start planning to repair docks and sea walls. This is a short window of opportunity once it has begun so don't get caught behind the curve. Start your permit applications early and avoid delays. Rip Rap and Soil cloth will be available for purchase from the Association as always.

We have experienced yet more damage on the soccer fields due to wet conditions and vehicles being driven off the road. Please exercise common sense during wet weather conditions and refrain from taking vehicles off the roadway. Deliberate damage will be investigated and charges filed.

We are continuing our collection efforts. Members who may have difficulty staying current with this requirement should contact the office and communicate with us any special needs. Dues and Assessments come due January 1st.







### **Old Business**

### **Golf Carts/Slow Moving Vehicles**

**Dave Decker** – We have the proposed rule in front of us. Does anyone have any questions or comments?

### Verbiage discussion ensues.

Golf carts and all-terrain vehicles with valid Holishor decals and lot numbers be allowed on Holiday Shores roads where posted speed limit is 35 miles or less. Operators and the slow-moving vehicles must meet the requirements as set out in accordance to IL statue (625 ILCS 5/11-1426.1) Vehicle operators must have a valid state driver's license. The vehicle at a minimum, must have the following: brakes, a steering apparatus, tires, a rearview mirror, red reflectorized warning devices in the front and rear, a slow moving emblem on the rear of the non-highway vehicle, a headlight that emits a white light visible from a distance of 500 feet to the front, a tail lamp that emits a red light visible from at least 100 feet from the rear, brake lights, and turn signals. When operated on a roadway, a non-highway vehicle shall have its headlight and tail lamps lighted. The state requires proof of minimum liability insurance coverage carried within the vehicle.

Members in good standing must purchase Holishor decals for the golf carts and all-terrain vehicles that meet minimum safety requirements in the Holishor office for \$15 annually.

### **2019 Ditching Project**

**Dave Decker** – At the last meeting, we had a bid opening. We had one bidder and we turned that over to the office for their review. We also have a write up from Rob Clarkson in front of us.

**Tony Harris** – In previous meetings, we discussed the estimates that we had from the prior engineering firm until we got the bids in. I know we were thinking the bid would be less than what the firm had proposed. It looks like we are coming back in total more.

**Rob Clarkson** – I think it's the fact that we only had one bidder. If we had more bidders, we would have seen a significant difference.

Steve Yates - Was timing of the bids an issue?

**Rob Clarkson** – One of them actually told me they work with the bidder that we got. When they found out they were bidding it, they backed out because they did not want to lose work over it.

**Steve Yates** – I understand.

**Rob Clarkson** – The others, I don't know why they didn't turn them in. They seemed very interested. I just can't believe everyone is that busy. **Dave Decker** – I'm confused reading your write up. I thought this bid was under what we had estimated?

Rob Clarkson – It is under what we estimated from the old engineering. We took out some of the work to make it even cheaper. Going forward, it's hard to see what culvert pipes are actually good. Based on the engineer's recommendation was to take all of them out and replace them. The driveways, some of them did not get culverts put back in but it was to remove them in piece, and we decide which ones are good. We would then stock pile them for the next section in the lieu of buying new ones. There is an awful lot of culvert pipes in this plan.

**Dave Decker** – The bid we submitted included the removing of the culverts or did not include them?

Rob Clarkson – They removed every single one is what this bid is and replacing them. We would stock pile the good ones that came out to use later down the road. Up front, we would pay quite a bit for culvert replacements. The only thing we had them replacing as far as driveways went was an asphalt driveway or rock. The concrete where they cut, we are going to have our crew come pour that concrete to save money from the contractor doing it. The seeding, we are going to come in behind them and seed instead of paying them to do so.

**Dave Decker** – I wasn't aware we were planning on doing our own concrete work. I personally wouldn't have liked that idea. Our maintenance guys are not concrete guys.

**Anthony Harrell** – Are you saying the original quote they gave us included concrete?

**Rob Clarkson** – No, it didn't. We also added three culverts to the plan from the original bid which made our bid higher than the

original.

**Dave Decker** – Just for your knowledge because you were not involved at the time, when they did the work and had the bids done for replacing culverts on the road replacement efforts, the estimate from the Association was higher than it was from the vendor to replace them.

Rob Clarkson – Ok. My point was that we added three culverts.

Dave Decker – I get that we added that but that was part of the bid going out, right? I'm just surprised that we took out the concrete work from the bid we were submitting out. What I would recommend in the future if we are thinking about doing that, put that on as an add-on so you have a choice to see what their cost is, and we can see whether or not we can do better. What is the estimate that we believe the concrete work is going to be?

**Rob Clarkson** – I am still working on that and going over square yardage for what the concrete cost will be.

**Dave Decker** – What's the Board's thoughts on having our crew doing concrete driveways?

**Tony Harris** – I would like to get an additional bid from these guys to see what they would charge. All we have is the engineer's estimate, it would be nice to see what these guys are going to charge so we have a comparison number.

**Rob Clarkson** – It's a three-foot cut on a driveway.

**Monica O'Brien** – My concern would be quality, but I know a lot of these driveways on Clover are not high quality at all.

**Dave Decker** – But if we are putting them in, they better be. We can't put in low quality concrete work.

**Tony Harris** – I would hope for a three or four-foot-wide cut, it shouldn't be that bad.

**Dave Decker** – How many are we talking about?

**Rob Clarkson** – I've gone out and looked at six of them already. Not all of them are double driveways either. I'll have a number for you at the next meeting of the exact cost it would be for us to do it minus the labor.

**Tony Harris** – It shouldn't be that hard to pour. Especially pouring edge to edge and your elevations are already there.

**Rob Clarkson** – That's what I thought.

Matt Ressler - I'm fine with us doing it.

Steve Yates - I don't see any reason why we couldn't do it.

**Monica O'Brien** – That's what I'm hearing. I feel like you guys know what you are doing.

Steve Yates - My only draw back of us doing it is if you put it in and

### Firefighter's Footnote & Medic Minute



a busy year for the Holiday Shores Volunteer Fire Department. We held sever alfundraisers, helped

out at many Holiday Shores functions, had many training events and went on various service runs. To date (as this is written, the year is not yet over), we have made 204 calls for the year. They include: medical calls, fires, motor vehicle accidents, lift assists, assisting other agencies, CO detector checks, and downed power lines. In December, we had our department Christmas party where Santa made a visit and passed out presents. We also held our annual trustee Christmas dinner at the Clubhouse. We had a Fire Trivia night at the station along with a few make-up dates to finish our required training. On Saturday, January 25th we will hold our annual fundraiser - our Chicken and Beer Dance with tickets \$25 each for those age 21 and over. Dinner starts serving at 6:30pm with chicken, fries, beer and soda provided - bring a side dish if you want. The entertainment will be provided by The Owlz Band. Call Mark for tickets at 618-444-6056. We here at HSFD hope everyone had a Merry Christmas and that 2020 brings you a very safe, healthy and Happy New Year!

Medic Minute – Frost Nip/Frostbite – The differences between frost nip and frost bite are the severity of the injury. Frost nip is an injury that occurs on the surface of the skin and doesn't affect the deeper layers. Frostbite happens when the body part freezes as a result of prolonged exposure to cold, and then develops ice crystals within the cells, which rupture and causes cell death. Frost bite skin is pale or blue, stiff or rubbery to the touch, and feels cold and numb. There may be loss of function in the frozen area, and blisters may develop as the frost bitten area warms.



To prevent skin damage you should stay dry and out of the wind in extreme cold, and cover exposed skin. To keep the body's core temperature up: wear layers of clothing –

wool and polypropylene are good insulators, wear wind and water proof outer layers and wool socks, and well-fitting waterproof boots; wear a hat to prevent heat loss from your head and mittens rather than gloves to protect fingers; keep protective clothing and blankets in your car in case of a break down in an isolated area; and don't drink alcohol or smoke when out in extreme cold.

Home treatments include: get inside or take shelter from the wind; check for hypothermia and treat it before treating frostbite; don't rewarm the area if refreezing is possible - wait until vou reach shelter; warm small areas (such as ears, face, nose, fingers and toes) with warm breath or by tucking hands or feet inside warm clothing next to bare skin - protect the frozen body part from further exposure and if possible, immerse the body part in warm water (104-108 degrees) for 15-30 minutes; don't rub or massage the frozen area, as it will further damage tissue - avoid walking on frostbitten feet if possible; keep the frost bitten part warm and elevated - wrap with blankets or soft material to prevent bruising; blisters may appear as the skin warms - the skin may turn red, burn, tingle, or be very painful, and an over-the-counter pain reliever may help.

Call your health provider if: the skin is white or blue, hard and cold – rewarming under the care of a professional and antibiotic treatment are needed to prevent infection and permanent tissue damage; if blisters develop during rewarming – don't break them as the risk of infection is very high; or if signs of infection develop – increased pain, swelling, redness or tenderness, heat or red streaks extend from the area, discharge or pus, or fever of 100 degrees or higher with no other cause.

<u>Hypothermia</u> – Hypothermia occurs when the body loses heat faster than it can be produced by muscle contractions and shivering, and the body temperature drops below normal. It is an emergency and can quickly lead to unconsciousness and death if the heat loss continues. Early symptoms of hypothermia include shivering, cold and pale skin, sleepiness or lethargy, and impaired judgment. Later symptoms include cold abdomen, slow pulse and breathing, weakness or drowsiness, and confusion. Shivering may stop if the core body temperature drops below 96 degrees. People who have heart disease, diabetes, and are inactive are at increased risk of hypothermia, along with those taking narcotics, barbiturates, and sleeping pills. Certain medications used to treat anxiety, high blood pressure, and depression can also

put you at increased risk. Some older adults may be less likely to notice cool temperatures, and they may not maintain a normal body temp as well. Indoor temperatures below 65 degrees also increases the risk. Set your thermostat at 65 degrees or higher, or wear several layers of warm clothes, eat regularly, get up and move around frequently, wear warm clothes to bed with several blankets, and if heating your whole house is a problem, then heat just a couple rooms and close off the others.

When outdoors for long periods, take the following precautions: dress warmly and wear wind and waterproof clothing, and wear fabric that remains warm even when wet such as wool or polypropylene; keep protective clothing and blankets in your car for emergencies; wear a warm hat since you can lose about 10% of your body heat through your head; get to some shelter and put on warm dry clothing; eat well before going out since your body uses calories to produce heat (preferably protein); don't drink alcohol as this makes your lose heat faster and you may not notice that you are becoming chilled.

The goal of treating hypothermia is to stop additional heat loss and to slowly rewarm them –



warming someone at one degree per hour is best. Some warming tips for mild cases are: get them out of the cold and wind, give them dry or wool clothing to wear and warm fluids to drink, and increase the room temperature. For more serious cases: remove cold wet clothes, warm them with your own body heat by wrapping a blanket or sleeping bag around both of you, if they are awake and alert you can give them warm liquids and high-energy foods such as candy - do not give them anything if they are disoriented or unconscious, and don't give them any alcohol. Rewarming someone in warm water can cause shock or heart attack, but in an emergency when help is not available and when other treatments aren't working, you can use a warm water bath (100-105 degrees) as a

Call 911 immediately if the person is extremely confused or loses consciousness, has late symptoms of hypothermia, if the body temperature is 95 degrees or lower, if early symptoms are not improving after one hour of home treatment, if the person is frail, weak or older, or if the body temperature doesn't return to normal after four hours of warming.



At 3:30am on August 30th, I woke to someone pounding on my front door. After arming myself, I went to the front door to confront the person screaming incoherently and pounding away. Every so often I heard a popping sound coming from the far end of the house. I opened the door to find my neighbor, Gary Henderson looking anxious and shouting, "your house is on fire, your house is on fire." Quickly, we gathered our dogs and ran outside. Gary explained that he looked out his bedroom window and noticed our entire back yard lit up and realized the southwest corner of the house was ablaze. He sprinted past our house and alarmed our next-door neighbors, Dan and Terri Corey. Both families called 911, the early warning by Gary got us out of the house before smoke got to our bedroom, all living things got out unharmed.

The Holiday Shores Fire Department led by Chief Steve Cooper arrived promptly followed by neighboring departments that Chief Cooper notified after he saw the extent of the fire. The Holiday Shores Department operated quickly and efficiently. It was an impressive show to watch them go about their work to save the house. Within forty-five minutes of arrival, the fire was out, and the crews were securing their gear. At its peak, the fire was nearly under the roof, if it got under the roof the damage would have quickly been more extensive.

Karen and I wish to thank our good neighbors Gary and Mary Henderson and Dan and Terri Corey for rushing to our aid in the middle of the night. We also thank the Holiday Shores Fire Department and Chief Cooper for their extraordinary ability and professionalism in saving our home.





## Keeping Us Out of the Fire

He grabs you, wraps you in his own personal fireproof blanket and pushes you onto the ground. Finally the fire passes. The heat diminishes. It's over. You peek out of the blanket and see a body on the ground. Then it hits you, your rescuer gave his shield and his life so that you could be saved.

That's really the way it is. The sinful things we do in life, light a fire that eventually comes to destroy us. Jesus is the only One who can save us from the inferno of our sin. This he does at the cost of his own life. There is nothing stupid about this, just a demonstration of love and compassion.



## NEW RULE CHANGES EFFECTIVE JANUARY 2020

### **Prohibited Watercraft**

The following watercraft shall not be allowed on Holiday and Su Twan Lakes:

Watercraft with open unrestricted exhaust or without a muffler system is prohibited. The use of optional unrestricted exhaust on watercraft so equipped is prohibited. (Boats as listed above registered with the Association prior to 3/26/97 are grandfathered.)

- Drag boats or racing boats.
- Boats with head facilities on board which are not self-contained systems.
- 2 stroke PWC's greater than 85HP.
- 4 stroke PWC's greater than 150HP.
- Personal Hovercrafts. (Ref Board of Directors Meeting 3/8/95)
- Any watercraft except tubular bottom pontoon boats with a Length Overall greater than 22 feet (ref. size limits section).
- Any tubular bottom pontoon boats with a Length Overall greater than 28 feet Length (ref. size limits section). (*Board of Directors Meeting August 28, 2019*)

### Holiday Shores Watercraft Test

Individuals ages sixteen and under are required to take the Holiday Shores Watercraft Test before operating a motorized watercraft on Holiday and Su Twan Lake. The test format will be open, meaning it can be printed online or given from the Holishor Office and then graded by the Holishor Office. The test will only be required once unless a moving violation has occurred. If a moving violation has occurred, the violator and the member will be required to retake the test prior to operating a motorized watercraft.






