# Manager's Report by Angie Webster



March brings the anticipation of the Spring months to come. You will see maintenance crews out and about cleaning up rock and road edges. We will be measuring and getting the 2025 road repairs and resurfacing scheduled.

There will be 2 seats on the Board of Directors to be voted on at the Annual Meeting in May. Both of these positions will be 3 year terms. Applications are available in the office, and on the website. All applications must be turned in the office by close of business on April 6th.

Volunteers are needed for the lakes and dams committee. During draw down years, the committee will go by boat and make recommendations on dock and sea wall repairs that are needed.

2025 is a draw-down year, making it a great time for seawall, erosion, and dock repairs. Please check with the office to see if you are required to have a permit for your repairs. Permit applications are available in our office and website. We have soil cloth and rip rap for sale through our office for your upcoming repairs.

Our trash service contract is coming up in June of 2025. Jim McCann and I will be meeting with the representative from Republic this month to discuss, changes and pricing. We will be getting bids from at least two additional service providers, and provide these to the Board for review. It has come to my attention that a lot of our residents do not know we have free bulk item pick up included in our trash contract. Members can call and schedule up to two large items weekly for pick up (i.e. couches, dressers, appliances), There is no additional charge for this. Yard waste collection starts back up again on April 3rd.

The second installment of dues and assessments were due March 1st. Members who are experiencing difficulties, please reach out to the office to make arrangements, we are here to help keep you in good standing.

Our Annual Audit was February 19th thru February 21st.





# Holishor Association Board of Director's Minutes

# **January 8, 2025**

### Call to Order

John Crotty called the meeting to order at 7:34 p.m.

**Board Members in Attendance:** Jennifer Halverson, John Crotty, Ty Van Ryswyk, Tony Harris, Sarah Jacoby

Association Office Present: Angie Webster, Karla Suttles

**Members Present: 26** 

Board Members Excused: Jim McCann, Trish Yates

Pledge of Allegiance recited.

**Approval of Minutes** 

Changes noted to the minutes: No changes.

**Tony Harris** *motioned* to approve December 11, 2024 minutes as presented, **Sarah Jacoby** seconded, all in favor, motion passed.

**Transfers of Property** 

There were 2 transfers of property, 1 had initiation fees. Membership is at 1273.

**Bills & Salaries** 

**Tony Harris** *motioned* to approve the bills & salaries, **Sarah Jacoby** seconded, all in favor, motion passed.

**Treasurer's Report** 

**Profit & Loss Summary:** 

Jennifer Halverson: Angie when you and I reviewed the budget last week to address my questions, you made note that some of our attorney fees were in the wrong line item. From what I can tell, this was shifted to 740 Bad Debt. What is the delineation between collections and bad debt? Angie Webster: Bad Debt accounts for questions to the attorney and Collections accounts for attorney fees to collect funds outstanding. Jennifer Halverson: We also discussed the AT&T beach phone lines Jennifer Halverson: As part of our review, we discussed the emergency phones that are not in compliance and a potential cost savings on that expense. I am going to add it as an action item to track updating the lines. Angie Webster: Acknowledged the phone lines are out of compliance and has been working with AT&T to update the lines and equipment. Currently, we are not paying anything for the line due to AT&T's inability to provide the correct equipment and properly address the issue.

## Treasurer's report:

The calculations in the report were incorrect, and the balances do not look correct. Action: The board has requested a revised document to be presented at the January 22, 2025, meeting for review.

Manager's Report & Code Enforcement Report

**Angie Webster** read the manager's report (which can be found published in full in the Holiday Times).

**John Crotty** summarized the code enforcement report and noted five incidents: three vehicle-related, including two car wrecks and one vehicle in the north pond, and two Sheriff assists.

## **Old Business**

**Boat Rule Change** – At the November meeting, we reviewed changes to the boating rules that included updates to identify which infraction aligned to which boating rule.

Changes identified include: References to Article XIII (which will be designated in an upcoming bylaw change) and a reference to Article XI (which we are recommending to eliminate as a bylaw). Given the changes, and per the rule change process, this final approval will be tabled until the next meeting, on January 22.

Action: Jennifer Halverson to make the updates noted and send to the office to post.

**Sediment Removal Update** – Feedback received after the last meeting. Changes were made to the proposal. The board is asked to review and be prepared to discuss at the January 22 meeting.

**Article XI Boating Bylaw Change** – This bylaw contains 2 boating rules which are duplicated in the Boating Rules. The proposal is to remove the content from this bylaw allowing changes to the rule without requiring a bylaw change. **Tony Harris** *motioned* to add the bylaw change to the annual meeting ballot, **Ty Van** 

Ryswyk seconded, all in favor, motion passed.

Article IX – Penalties – Fines and Penalties Bylaw Change - This bylaw change addresses formatting and clarity in Article IX and its related sections. With this change, the two subsections, "Fines and Penalties for Violation of Rules and Regulations" and "Holishor Association Administrative Procedure and Appeal Process for Violation of Rules and Regulations," will be formally labeled as articles, aligning with standard bylaw formatting. Additionally, the change removes boating rules from the bylaw. There are additional changes that are not clear in the document provided. Action: Jennifer will send a marked-up version of the file to clearly see the changes and correct the numbering for Article XIV.

### **New Business**

**2025 Reserve Items** – The reserve schedule outlines the replacement of large-ticket items based on their life expectancy, with expenditures pre-approved at the January board meeting for flexibility. For 2025, the proposed reserve expenditures total \$544,500 and include: An ATV replacement. Silt removal for the North Pond, funded in part by reallocating dredge-related funds and selling the dredge. A truck replacement approved last year at \$55,000, now estimated at \$57,000, with a request to approve up to \$60,000. Repairs to a public dock, expected to cost less than the allocated \$25,000. A potential replacement of the code enforcement truck due to ongoing issues. **Tony Harris** *motioned* to approve the reserve expenditures, **Ty Van Ryswyk** seconded, all in favor, motion passed.

Correspondence

Holishor Fishing Committee – The Fishing Committee requests an increase in funding from \$9,000 in 2025 to \$12,500 starting in 2026, with a 3% annual increase thereafter, to align with the Finance Committee's ongoing 2026 budget planning. Angle is providing us with an updated version of the fish stocking report so we can determine the year over year increase. Matt Ressler (2064): With the current budget, we risk reducing the number of fish stocked, impacting not just the main lake but also four additional lakes, which the board needs to consider. The current budget is insufficient to stock all lakes effectively. The committee has requested additional funds and asked for a timeline on when the board will respond to this request. **Tony Harris:** Indicated that we are starting to work on the 2026 budget and will have to see where this fits in but our primary focus is silt and roads. Ty Van Ryswyk: Asked for clarification from the committee on the ask, do they want a one-time increase or an increase on the 3% yearly. Sarah Jacoby: Asked for stocking data, fundraising amounts, and explanation why the committee felt that they were short in 2025. Angie Webster: Confirmed that the total spent in 2024 was \$18k for 7k large mouth bass and 4k hybrid. Matt Ressler (2064): Confirmed that the Tiki Bar Bass Club contributed \$4k this year and explained that they will be short in 2025 due to switch from a fall to spring stock as fundraisers occur after the planned stock. **Brian Wood (1305)**: The fishing committee plans to stock fish in the spring instead of fall to avoid winter-related survival issues and to prevent smaller fish (4-6 inches) from being eaten during the lake drawdown in 2025, which would waste resources. The committee is requesting additional funds, clarifying that the year-over-year budget increase should be adjusted to reflect rising costs, as the price of largemouth bass has increased by 45 cents per fish to \$1.55, far exceeding the previously accounted 3% annual increase. Noted that we are stocking about 15 fish per acre. **Trenton Foiles (2109)**: The size of the fish plays a critical role in their survival, as an inch or two can make a significant difference; larger fish, closer to six inches, are much less likely to be eaten than smaller ones around four inches. The fish supplier has committed to replenishing the lost stock this spring. Tony Harris: Suggested 6-8 inch fish as it was only .25 per fish. If we are stocking 5,000 fish annually and all tournaments are catch-and-release, what's happening to the fish? Are they being eaten, dying, or just being caught by residents? **Trenton Foiles (2109)**: We have a larger release boat for our catch-and-release tournaments. We are actively building more structures in the lake to give fish places to hide from predators. We' have moved to spring stocking, which gives fish a better chance to grow quickly and avoid being eaten. We need hybrid striped bass to help control the overpopulation of shad, which makes it harder for anglers to catch fish since the fish have an abundant food source. Matt Ressler (2064): The fishing committee revised the creel



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# HOLIDAY SHORES FIRE DEPARTMENT

Medic Minute - Walking is one of the easiest ways to work out with lots of benefits. According to WebMD, just by walking you can strengthen your bones and your heart, and lose weight. It also lowers your blood pressure, blood sugar, and "bad" LDL cholesterol level, while raising your "good" HDL. You can walk anywhere - in your local mall, park, or on a treadmill. Start slowly for 5-10 minutes at a time and work your way up to at least 30 minutes, 3-4 times a week. Walking at a brisk pace makes a good cardio workout. You can also carry light weights to help build upper body strength while walking. Wear shoes that support your arch and slightly elevates you heels. Before starting any exercise program, check with your health care provider first.

Do you really need to walk 10,000 steps daily? As it turns out, that goal is arbitrary. Recent studies suggest that walking close to 8,000 steps for 1 to 2 days per week helps to reduce mortality. In August of 2023, the European Journal of Preventive Cardiology compiled 17 studies of 226,889 people. The results showed significant health benefits and reduced mortality from any cause just by walking a minimum of almost 4,000 steps a day. Reduced risk of dying from cardiovascular disease (heart attack and stroke) decreased at about

2,400 steps per day. These benefits increase with the number of steps you take until you reach about 7,500 steps per day, where the benefits plateau. Everyone can benefit from this simple exercise. The idea is to make walking a regular part of your day.

# Firefighter's Footnote -

Some members of Holiday Shores Fire Department reached noteworthy milestones recently. In December, Chief Jim O'Brien attained 20 years of service and Captain Michael Hayes reached 35 years of service with our department! Lieutenant Nikki Opel responded to her **1,000th** call in January! We celebrate these three members and their amazing achievements and are honored and proud to have such dedicated people be a part of our team. In February, we reviewed Drivers Safety and Scenario Planning and practiced our Advanced Medical Interventions and Pharmacy Review. This month we will go over SCBA Drills, Building Construction/Fire Flows and Trauma Review. Last month we responded to 16 incidents: 11 EMS calls, and 1 each for building fire, MVA, gas leak, electrical problem, and no incident found on arrival. Not everyone can reach the milestones mentioned above, but we depend on volunteers to operate and run our department. You



can join at whatever level works for you from auxiliary, to medical, to firefighting. Come up any Monday evening from 7-9pm to talk to us. Check out our website at www.hsfd.org and follow us on Facebook.

limits, increasing the size limit and reducing the number of fish that can be taken for consumption. Enforcement relies largely on an honor system. Tony Harris: Asked if any additional structures would be put in this year. Matt Ressler (2064): The fishing committee was previously approved to place structures in the lake and installed over 100, but progress stalled due to a lack of resources and the labor-intensive nature of the work. They have since secured a new supplier for scrap pipe to continue building structures at no cost to the board or association. Ten approved locations still lack structures, and the committee acknowledges it's time to resume this effort. **Jason Lowry (1714):** We are facing increased fishing pressure as more residents are actively fishing, which impacts the fish population despite the creel limits we have in place. Tournament mortality is another factor, as not all fish survive after being caught and released, even with our best efforts to protect them. Overpopulation of crappie is also a challenge, as it affects the survival of fry (baby bass) and makes it harder to restore the bass population naturally. Our goal as a committee is to address these issues by adding more structures, managing crappie numbers, and improving the lake's ecosystem to ensure sustainability for future generations. We are committed to making the lake better for the long term, so it can be enjoyed by both current residents and future kids in the community.

**Cindy Manos (2082) Polar Plunge Request** - The request to organize a Polar Plunge event at the main beach in February to benefit Amare NFP. The beach is closed during this time, so she is seeking board approval to use the beach. The event would include the plunge, hot beverages, snacks, and a raffle, with all necessary safety measures in place.

**Dawn Schmitt (372):** Recommended liability waivers signed by participants. **Cindy Manos (2082):** Agreed to send a copy of the waiver that will be used to Angie for review and will have participants sign at the event. **Tony Harris** *motioned* to approve the request for the polar plunge, **Sarah Jacoby** seconded, all in favor, motion passed

# **Action Summary**

**Prior Actions:** 

Angie to get bids on marquee replacement on Prairietown road. **Target February 26.** Angie to send spreadsheet with fish cost to the board to see year over year cost. **Angie is continuing to pull old invoices to update data.** Angie to proceed with engaging an engineering group to assess the Biscay culvert. **Will start after snow removal has been addressed.** Board to review the year over year fish cost and determine if the annual increase can be adjusted. Angie to identify sign placement and language and put the signs in place. New Actions: Angie to work with ATT to update the phone lines for the emergency phones at the beaches. (check quarterly). Angie to review the calculations in the treasurer report for the January 22 meeting. Jennifer to submit an updated version of the boating rules to the office. Jennifer to submit an updated and marked up version of Article IX to the office and the board.

### **Open Forum**

The following items were discussed: **Alan Boeser (188):** Proposed a \$20 sticker fee for all motorized boats, estimating \$20,000 to \$30,000 annually. Funds could be split, with half for fish stocking, and half banked for future silt removal projects. Asked whether this would require a membership vote or board approval. **Tony Harris:** Noted that this was put to vote at a prior annual meeting and failed. If the additional funds are included in the budget and the request for the sticker fails, a special meeting will be required to approve a revised budget.

# **Approval of Minutes**

Changes noted to the minutes: Typos were noted and meeting minutes were amended

**Tony Harris** *motioned* to approve January 8, 2025 minutes as presented, **Jim McCann** seconded, all in favor, motion passed.

### **Transfers of Property**

There were 2 transfers of property, 2 had initiation fees. Membership is at 1273.

### **Treasurer's Report**

The Treasurer's report is being reviewed again because the January report was submitted with outdated information and has been resubmitted for review, with the December report included for comparison.

### **Old Business**

**Boat Rule Change** – At the November meeting, we reviewed changes to the boating rules that included updates to identify which infraction aligned to which boating rule. In the January meeting, changes were identified to remove the references to Article XIII (which will be designated in an upcoming bylaw change) and a reference to Article XI (which we are recommending to eliminate as a bylaw). Given the changes, and per the rule change process, this final approval was tabled until this board meeting to allow identification of any other adjustments.

**Tony Harris:** Noted on page 13 under Reckless Operation, remove "to jump the wake of another vessel", since this is considered careless operations. Based on this change, the final approval will be deferred until the next meeting.

**Sediment Removal Update** – Revisions to the bid request were submitted to the board at January 8 meeting for the board to review. Feedback from the board included typos and minor language changes. **Tony Harris** *motioned* to approve the scope with the changes made, **Sarah Jacoby** seconded, all in favor, motion passed.

Article IX – Penalties – Fines and Penalties Bylaw Change - This bylaw change addresses formatting and clarity in Article IX and its related sections. With this change, the two subsections, "Fines and Penalties for Violation of Rules and Regulations" and "Holishor Association Administrative Procedure and Appeal Process for Violation of Rules and Regulations," will be formally labeled as articles, aligning with standard bylaw formatting. Additionally, the change removes boating rules from the bylaw. Tony Harris: Asked if we should move the boating rule fine structure to the boating rules document. Jim McCann: Noted that per CICA, fines must be approved by the membership, which means it needs to be retained as a bylaw. Tony Harris motioned to approve the penalties change language to be prepared for a ballot for the annual meeting, Jim McCann seconded, all in favor, motion passed.

Article IV – Section 8 Proposed Bylaw change – Revisions to the bylaw clarify that no refunds for prepaid dues or assessments will be issued to lessors or lessees, require owners to follow the Common Interest Community Association Act, and mandates that owners provide a copy of the lease and notify the association office of any changes. Tony Harris: Asked why we referenced the Common Interest Community Association Act. Jim McCann: The purpose of referencing CICA is to ensure the bylaws automatically align with any changes in the law. Similar to the boating rules, which reference state, local, and federal laws, this

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

approach keeps the bylaws compliant without requiring frequent reviews or legal updates. **Jennifer Halverson:** The intent of specifically referencing CICA in this section is to inform owners that certain laws directly impact them. **Tony Harris** motioned to create a ballot for this to go to the annual meeting, **Sarah Jacoby** seconded, all in favor, motion passed.

Article IV - Section 3 Proposed Bylaw change - Revisions to the bylaw clarify that payment of dues and assessments is the sole responsibility of the owner, even when a lessee is involved. **Tony Harris**: Tony questioned the necessity of specifying "owner" before "member." Jim McCann: Responded that "owner member" should remain to clarify that the responsibility lies with the owner given that we have other member types (associate, employee). Tony Harris: Suggested to change "rental property" to "occupied property" ensuring the wording covers both rented and rent-free occupancy scenarios. Tony Harris motioned to create a ballot for the annual meeting with the noted change, **Trish Yates** seconded, all in favor, motion passed.

### **New Business**

Fireworks – A proposal for the 2025 fireworks from J&M Displays is ready for review and approval. This is based on a 3-year agreement that we made with them in 2024. **Tony Harris** motioned to pay half of the fee ahead of time and the other half afterwards, **Sarah Jacoby** seconded, all in favor, motion passed. CorrespondenceSki Club – The Ski Club is hosting their annual fundraiser on April 4 and is requesting that we waive the ballroom fee. **Trish Yates** motioned to approve waiving the clubhouse rental fee, **Jim McCann** seconded, all in favor, motioned passed. Anthony Harrell (560) & Alan Boeser (188) - Correspondence received asking the board to further discuss the option to charge for boat stickers to assist with the fish stocking costs. **Anthony Harrell (560)**: Biologists identified an imbalance in the lake's ecosystem due to crappie overpopulation. To address this, they proposed a \$20 boat sticker fee, with proceeds split between fish stocking and silt removal. They asked for board feedback on the proposal and whether it requires a rule or bylaw change. This fee would supplement funds raised by the Bass club and provide consistent support for these critical efforts. Today, we seek the board's feedback on whether to explore this proposal further and clarification on whether implementing it requires a rule or bylaw change. Alan Boeser (188): Acknowledges that the budget is under review but they believe that they need these funds and will continue to pursue the funding. They proposed a \$20 boat sticker fee as an alternative funding source, emphasizing that the fee should come from all boaters who use the lake. Questioned if this should be a rule or a bylaw. **Tony Harris:** Noted that a prior board proposed a charge for boat stickers and this was voted down at an annual meeting. At that time, the budget assumed inclusion of the additional funds. Because it was not approved, the budget had to be revised, which requires a special meeting. Alan Boeser (188): Asked how many signatures were required to put this on the ballot. Jim **McCann**: Recommended 150 signatures as each one will have to be verified as a member in good standing and one per household. (Current bylaw indicates 10% of the membership). **Anthony Harrell (560)**: Noted that the cost of the golf cart (non-highway) decal fee is not noted in the rules. **John Crotty**: Noted that the non-highway decal fee was new, whereas the fee for a boat decal has always been free and indicated that this should be reviewed at an annual meeting. Sarah **Jacoby**: I think we might be getting ahead of ourselves. We are still reviewing the budget to determine if we can support the funding request for 2026. The sticker idea is a good long-term solution, but it may be better considered as part of future budget planning. Given the annual meeting in May, we are also tight on timing to evaluate and decide if it's appropriate to implement right now. Additionally, we may need to keep this option in our back pocket to raise funds for other community needs over the next few years. **Tony Harris**: Noted that the price of fish only went up for one type of fish and not across the board. Shocking reports also indicate that the lake is healthy. **John Crotty**: Questioned the ask for funding and reiterated that we don't have data to justify the ask. **Anthony Harrell (560)**: Noted that there are records from the bass club and letters from biologist. Noted that shocking provides a snapshot of the fish population at a given time, focusing only on certain fish that are shallow, which limits its ability to represent the entire ecosystem. While it gives insight into the health and size of specific fish, it doesn't

show the full picture. Overpopulation of crappie stunts the growth of bass and leads to thousands of small crappie. To address this imbalance, efforts like crappie tournaments have been held to thin the population and improve the lake's ecosystem health. **John Crotty:** Questioned stocking fish before completing structures, suggested prioritizing funding for structures, and asked how long it would take to see results. **Trenton Foiles (2109)**: The tubing for fish structures is sourced as free scrap, collected, prepared, and installed in the lake by volunteers, requiring no additional funding. Brian Wood (1305): Ordered five to six-inch fish based on the board's recommendation, even though they cost a bit more, because they are more likely to survive. Larger fish are being added since the lake's natural reproduction is not working well, with crappie eating most of the fry. To help fix the imbalance, hybrid stripers are being stocked as predator fish to control the crappie and shad populations. These decisions are not random, they have been made after talking to biologists to make sure they are doing what's best for the lake. Asked if the board would consider sponsoring an assessment refund as a raffle item to assist with raising funds. Sarah Jacoby: Asked if spring stocking improves survival rates and whether data supports the change. Raised timing concerns and suggested aligning the sticker fee with future budget planning. **Brian** Wood (1305): Noted that they are working with the biologist to determine the appropriate temperature for stocking. The fish are sourced from Illinois, Missouri, and Arkansas, with Arkansas offering the best prices despite slightly higher freight costs. Significant effort has gone into finding the best deals to maximize funds raised for stocking. The survivability rate for the fish transported from Arkansas was extremely high, with no reported deaths except for an estimated 1,000 hybrid stripers. The fish farm has agreed to replace these losses and will supply an additional 2,000 fish over the 2025 order to compensate. **Jennifer Halverson**: We need to ensure alignment with our governing covenants, rules, and bylaws, which require bids for expenditures exceeding \$15,000, even with contributions covering part of the cost. Would like to see a clear plan and regular updates, including quarterly reports on fishing tournament data (e.g., fish sizes), progress on installing fish structures with timelines, and completion tracking. Would also like to see independent assessments from three sources to better evaluate the lake's health and guide future decisions. **Brian Wood (1305)**: Noted that data is available and will share. The structure placement will occur when the lake is down. Noted that IL biologist retired, with no replacement. Agreed to ask IL if they can do an assessment. Biologist also talk to the fisherman as part of their assessment.

### **Action Summary**

Prior Actions: Angie to proceed with engaging an engineering group to assess the Biscay culvert (target March). Angie to get bids on marquee replacement on Prairietown road (target February). Angie to identify sign placement and language and put the signs in place. Once in place, this should be published on the website / social media and include pictures of the damages that were caused (target February) New Actions: Jennifer to update the boating rules to remove "to jump the wake of another vessel" and resend to the office to post. Board to discuss offering assessment for their raffle and provide an answer to the fishing committee.

### **Open Forum**

The following items were discussed: Lisa East (1302): Known / lost pets in our community that are outside of their yard and not on a physical leash. When we see a lost pet, who should the reports be going to? **Angie Webster:** The office does not actively handle lost animals unless code enforcement or patrol sees the animal and returns it to the owner. A pet finder book exists but has not been updated in years due to low participation. If a pet is repeatedly found out of its yard, the office issues a warning letter, escalating to fines for repeated violations. Members can report incidents by providing a photo, date, time, and lot number of the pet owner. Adjournment Motion to adjourn was made by Tony Harris, Trish Yates seconded, all in favor at 8:42 p.m.
