



Firefighter's Footnote

**Firefighter's Footnote** - Summer is in full swing and we hope everyone is safely enjoying the hot, sunny days. In July, we helped out at the Ski Show and the Fireworks display. We also went over our EMS refresher course and practiced our Fire/ Ground Management. In August, we will have our Truck Familiarization and Tool Usage, and review the Confined Space and Tech Rescue Awareness. Save the Date: we will hold our annual 9/11 Ceremony at sunset again this year. Last month we responded to 20 calls: 12 medical; 2 each for a vehicle accident, mutual aid, and detectors sounding; and 1 brush fire and 1 downed power line. Remember that Holiday Shores is a volunteer fire department. We give our time to serve the community and to help others. We can always use more volunteers. Anyone is welcome, no experience needed. We can teach you everything you need to know. You can see us on our website at www.hsfd.org or follow us on Facebook.

**M**edic Minute - Summer Safety Replay

(We are revisiting summer safety tips from a previous issue.) Summertime is when everybody enjoys themselves outdoors. Here are some tips to keep yourself safe. **Sunburn** - To prevent sunburn, avoid being in the sun between 10 a.m. and 3 p.m. Use a sunscreen with a SPF of at least 15 or higher (preferably 30 or higher), that offers both UVA and UVB protection, and has the active ingredient PABA (unless you are allergic to it). Apply 15-30 minutes before exposure and re-apply every two hours, even if it's waterproof. Note: a minimal amount of sunshine on the skin is needed to produce Vitamin D, which along with calcium are needed to strengthen bones and prevent osteoporosis. **Heat Exhaustion/Heat Stroke** – Heat exhaustion occurs when your body can't sweat enough to cool you off, with symptoms of fatigue, weakness, dizziness, nausea/vomiting and skin that's cool, clammy, pale or flushed. Make sure you wear lightweight and light-colored clothing, and take frequent breaks if working outdoors. Treatment incudes drinking lots of cool water, getting out of the sun to a cool spot, and sponging your body with cool water. Heat exhaustion can sometimes lead to heat stroke, which happens when your body stops sweating but your core temperature continues to rise, often to 105 degrees or higher. This requires emergency treatment. Symptoms are confusion, delirium or unconsciousness, and skin that's hot, dry, reddened or flushed - even under the armpits. Call

911 immediately.

**Bug Safety** – Summer is the time for mosquitos with concern for their transmission of several diseases, depending on where you are in the U.S. or other countries. Zika and West Nile viruses, St Louis encephalitis, malaria and dengue fever are potential life threatening illnesses. Use insect repellant with DEET, spray clothing with permethrin, wear long sleeves and pants, close windows, empty any areas of free-standing water, and use EPA approved indoor and outdoor insect sprays or foggers. Ticks can carry disease - the most widely known is Lyme disease, which is rising dramatically due to climate change. Ticks become infected after feeding off hosts with the bacteria, such as deer, mice and squirrels, and then transmitting it to humans. Symptoms include: a "bulls-eye" rash, fever, nausea/vomiting, palpitations, or joint pain and swelling. No test presently exists to identify tick bites or the type of tick. For removal of a tick: wear gloves, use forceps or tweezers to grab the tick at skin level without crushing it, gently pull until free - don't twist or turn, it may leave a piece in the skin. You can also put liquid soap onto a cotton ball and cover it for about 15-20 minutes, which may cause it to release itself. Place the tick into a sealable jar or plastic bag and take it to your doctor if you develop symptoms, who will then prescribe treatment with an antibiotic.



**Poisonous Plants** – Poison Ivy grows as a vine or shrub in the grass or on trees; Poison Oak grows only as a shrub, usually in the western U.S.; Poison Sumac is a tall shrub or small tree found in wooded areas of the eastern states. The rashes are caused by their oils and aren't contagious. Once the skin has been washed and clothing removed, it can't spread. Once exposed, you have about 10 minutes to wash away the oil or a rash may develop within 12 hours. You can use a topical hydrocortisone cream and an oral antihistamine for itching. If the eyes or a large area of rash is involved, contact your doctor.

# Honey Garlic Meatballs

1/2 cup ketchup 1/4 cup honey

3 cloves garlic, minced

2 TBSP chili-garlic sauce

2 TBSP soy sauce 1 tsp. Chinese five-spice powder 1 (2 pound) bag frozen cooked Meatballs

Combine ketchup, brown sugar, honey, garlic, chili-garlic sauce, soy sauce, and five-spice powder together in a bowl. Let sauce stand at room temperature for 1 hour.

Add frozen meatballs to a slow cooker. Pour sauce over meatballs and gently toss

Cook on LOW for 4 hours, stirring occasionally.

Prep 10 minutes, Cook 4 hours, Additional: 1 hour, Total 5 hours 10 minutes, Serving 5, Yields: 25 meatballs.

# Manager's Report by Rob Clarkson

Road surface renewal will be complete and 5 more miles of roads the 5<sup>th</sup> of August. We will be continuing to work repairs on the remaining roads, please be patient and understand we have limited manpower to accomplish this task while taking care of all the other amenities of Holiday Shores.

Lake Safety is everyone's responsibility. I witnessed boats traversing with people outside the railings, hanging off the outside, and being towed on floats such as lily pads. I have to stop and ask myself how anyone could possibly think this is a good idea. Please familiarize yourself with the laws of the state and the rules of Holishor for boating. Videos presented to my staff or taken by my staff will be submitted to IDNR and they will prosecute. State Laws can be found on the IDNR web site and the Holishor rules can be found on the Holishor web site.

The 75' and No-Wake buoys are in place to protect persons and properties. These are not merely suggestions and Lake Patrol has been instructed to strictly enforce. The definition of wake is outlined in our Boating Rules and I would encourage everyone to give these rules a look over and ensure your guests know them as well. The fishing arm of our lake is always No Wake. As a reminder if you have been issued a citation relating to boating you are required to take the Holiday Shores boating test, and pass, before operating your watercraft again.

The dry weather has slowed the grass growth. Tall grass poses another threat when its this dry which is fire. Keep your grass under the 10" maximum allowable height to avoid correspondence from my staff and possible fines. Your neighbors will appreciate this effort.

There is dirt available to members on the North Property. Make an appointment for loading Mon – Friday till 3:00 in your truck or trailer by calling office.

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
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



This month's meeting is scheduled for **Monday, August 15, 2022** at the Clubhouse, beginning promptly at **7:00 p.m.** The evening will start with the featured program ....."Italian Travels", with Patti Brown as speaker. Patti is also co-president of Garden Club, and will be sharing via a slide presentation, some of the interesting places she visited on her Italian trip. If you have never been to Italy or have questions about the country and culture, this is your chance to get an up-close glimpse from a tourist standpoint. As always, guests are welcome to attend any of the Garden Club programs and meetings. We like to see new faces!

In addition to the program and business part of this monthly meeting, the Garden Club members will also be voting on the Flower Of The Year competition plant. Earlier this spring, each member was given a special plant to nurture throughout the summer, in hopes of producing a winning flower and having their name engraved on the plaque of the traveling trophy. The plant chosen this year was the Bossa Nova Orange Begonia, which grows in sun/partial shade providing brightly colored flowers all summer. There will be an array of potted plants on display throughout the evening as part of this annual competition.

Garden topic this hot month is Groundcovers..... **Groundcover plants, when properly taken care of, provide dense soil cover, retard weed growth, prevent soil erosion, and require little maintenance**. In gardening, when you don't know what to do with a particular spot, you look at a variety of groundcovers. Groundcovers not only solve problems and save on mulching, but also unify different components in the landscape. They soften hardscapes such as walks, steps, and driveways and help define space by adding color and texture to a green landscape. In addition to the **commonly used evergreen types like ivy, pachysandra, vinca minor, and liriope**, there are numerous other varieties that will produce flowers and serve most any situation. A few non-aggressive favorite perennials to consider for your garden are as follows:

- . Sweet Woodruff (Galium odoratum)..Excellent in shady areas and grows 6"-10" tall. Fine textured foliage with small white flowers in spring.
- . Candytuft (Iberis sempervirens)..Slow spreading, mound forming evergreen for sunny areas, 8"-12" tall, with white flowers mid spring.
- . Bugleweed (Ajuga)....Light shade, grows 2"-3" tall with blue flowers in early spring, and forms a nice mat in well-drained soil.
- . Coral Bells (Heuchera)....Many varieties 12"-16" tall, with varying leaf colors, leaf size and leaf textures for sunny and shady areas.
- . Soapwort (Saponaria ocymoides)....Pink blooms from summer to fall, growing 12"-16" for sun to partial sun areas.
- **Dwarf Plumbago** (Ceratostigma)...Semi-evergreen, grows 6"-10" tall and prefers full sun to light shade. Blue flowers in late summer.
- . Foamflower (Tiarella)...Woodland plant prefers light to dense shade. Grows 10"-12" in mound, with bottle brush-like flowers in spring.
- . Sedum...All are drought tolerant, growing in full sun to light shade, with height ranges from 3"-2' tall. Wide range of leaf colors and textures.
- . Junipers (Juniperus Blue Chip or/Blue Rug)......Evergreen 8"-18" tall for sunny spots, and requires no shearing.
- Daylilies...All varieties grow well in full sun and partial sun areas, bloom in summer, and are available in a multitude of colors and sizes.
- . Hosta...Clump forming with summer flowers, preferring light to dense shade. Many different varieties ranging from 6" to 3' tall.

These are just a few ideas for groundcovers that can be used on steep slopes where mowing is difficult, for shady areas where turf grasses don't grow well, to serve in intensely hot, dry areas, to fill in garden spaces, and the best reason of all is to .... **choke out weeds!** <u>Groundcovers stretch across the soil like a living mulch, providing many of the same benefits as regular mulch.</u> Once established, they help deter germination of new weed seeds and prevent old weeds from returning by crowding them out. Groundcovers are very low maintenance!

Garden Tip for August: Perennials that are done blooming for the season may be divided and/or moved later in the month, as the roots will have time to re-establish before frost. Do not divide or move plants that thrive in the fall, such as asters and mums.





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Here is one of the facts of the Bible. Jesus has compassion on people. He cares deeply about what affects each of them. over old data, any new insight that fishermen may have and what we're going to stock in the lake this year. We have about the same amount of money as we did last year.

#### **Open Floor**

**Robert Wittkamp (1202)** Commented about an incident on the main beach in which the police were called. On social media people are upset about the association no longer having security (public safety). "I would like to make it and please stop me if I'm wrong here but security (public safety) could only call the cops. That's basically all they could do. So I understand people are upset but I think they really thought that security (public safety) could do more than what they really could. And I just wanted to kind of put that in the minutes here so it's well known that our security officers (public safety) when we had them really had no power. They were just the first person to call, which really just delayed the police officers from getting here. So I just wanted to put that out there so everybody knows that. And if I'm wrong, please tell me now." **John Crotty** "That's a true statement. It was public safety. We even encouraged public safety to not get in the middle of, especially violent fights, that were going on in this case. So if someone would have called them they would have just called Madison County." Jamie Mullins (1378) Expressed concern about not having public safety and seeing more boats come and go without stickers, vandalism, the break ins and trespassing, even loitering and non-residents fishing on the bank, pulling a bunch of fish out and then heading on to wherever they live. He is wondering if the board has a handle on it and wanted to bring it to everyone's attention. John Crotty We obviously continue to encourage everyone to lock the chain cable at the marina because we did put a rule in place last year that you can get fined for leaving the gate unlocked. There is now a Code Enforcement Officer that can be reached at 618-656-7233 ext. 6 or 618-567-6551. Lake patrol is scheduled 25 hours week, with roughly 15 of those on the weekend. They can be reached at varying times @ 618-531-7923. **Shaun Diltz** Members can also give out 4 (per year) Associate Member Cards giving that designated person permission to use the lake, beaches and tennis courts. They cannot put their personal boat on the lake but may drive a member's boat. Each designated Associate Member may bring 5 quests with them and no more than 10 total if multiple associate members of the same member both have guests out. **Brad Ritchey (2012)** Addressed the board about his experience while eating at the restaurant and having people that he assumes were not members smoking marijuana. This was in the afternoon while families were still dining outside. He also mentioned that he has seen multiple golf carts (SMV) on the streets with no decals or lot numbers. He asked what if the board is considering something to curtail this or is thinking about bring back public safety. He stated he would be willing to pay more to get back the "old Holiday Shores" when there was more of a "security patrol". John Crotty The code enforcement officer was originally one of our answers. Our public safety had a lot of people rotating through that role, as it was a very entry level role. So the board looked at as an option in the code enforcement officer as someone that would be here more often, get to know the neighborhood, know the rules better. And that person is still just kind of getting their feet wet, it's a very new role. We've just got lake patrol ramped up for the summer months. The board is in conversation with the office on how can we get the code enforcement officer's name out there more, let them see him more. We want to give this a trial run to see how it goes. I think it was an option for us, it may be better than when public safety was with the money we have. And if we see it's not working, then yes, the next option would be looking at do we need to have more funds put out there and actually have actual security out here similar to what was in the past **Trisha Yates** I'd just like to add on to that, the one thing that is free for us is to police ourselves as a community. I think it's on us at some point to be vigilant, not confrontational, but be vigilant. And it's not the same time that we were living in 20 years ago, everybody has phones, take pictures. And that is a way that we can enforce any infractions that are happening if we get pictures of people who aren't having spotters on their boat, if they're not following boating rules, take pictures, they have their lot numbers. If they're an authorized boat, their lot numbers are on their boat and we can do something about that. Even when we have lake patrol, even when we had the security, they can't be everywhere at once.

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

But at the same time, please do your part and take pictures so that we can make action and do something about it. **John Crotty** And those pictures can be sent to Rob or the office and he can do something with those. Rob Clarkson Even on state violations on the water, IDNR will follow up if you have a picture. Ty Van Ryswyk As a board member, I would like to add that I will never and haven't ever voted on something that I thought would be detrimental to the Association or our community. The public safety was changed to code enforcement after discussion and thoughts and kicking every idea around for public safety VS code enforcement. It wasn't somebody had an idea and we all voted it and that's what we're stuck with. We had issues. And we're trying to come up with a way to deal with those issues. And this is the process we've went with, and we're working with it. But if it needs changed as we evaluate it daily, weekly, monthly, we will do that as a board. And I would think the rest will never do anything that's detrimental to the community. I can guarantee you that. Lisa Purdy East (1302) Commented that the past public safety officers had wonderful relationships with the members and the last group not so much. She said they were not trained like the past public safety officers. She asked how the Code Enforcement Officer was nominated or given the job as she never saw it posted anywhere. She asked to know when, where, what the requirements were and the salary. She said she has looked back in the minutes and on Facebook and have found nothing posted about the Code Enforcement officer. She would like to see the job description of the Code Enforcement position and how that person was decided to be the better candidate for the position. **John Crotty** So the the budget that everybody received has the code enforcement officers salary in it. I don't know off the top of my head. There was a job description that was discussed at a board meeting when this was first brought up, back in October of last year. The job was not officially posted because we hired from within. **Shaun Diltz** So as far as it goes as a board, we hire the lake manager, the lake manager is going to hire his staff. I don't know if there's anything about posting anything public. But it was definitely discussed on the parameters of position. **John Crotty** There's no requirement saying he has to post all the staff positions. The board approved the job description of the code enforcement officer here at a board meeting back in October of last year. We reviewed it and approved it later in the year. **Shaun Diltz** It was an old business item for probably five or six meetings. **John Crotty** It was the decision of the lake manager. That's his. He had a description that was approved by the board, and he hired someone who he felt was the best candidate for that position. The office can provide you with a description of the Code Enforcement officer. Robert Wittkamp (1202) Again, as being part of the board who initiated the code enforcement officer change. I firmly stand behind that it was a good decision. As Ty said, if there's something needs to be changed, we can always they can always the board can always change that. Add to it, subtract. I believe the person who is in that position now is going

to be a huge asset to the Association. We have to give them some time on that. As far as the rest of the issues. Shaun, I greatly appreciate your you're willing to take phone calls. But I'm going to go back to if there is a problem. You don't need to call Shawn first. You need to call the police officers, you need to call Madison County, then if you would like to call Shaun, or whoever else has volunteered their time, please do so. But first and foremost, if someone is breaking the law, you need to take photos, video, whatever you can do. And your spouse or your buddy or whoever is next to you ,have them call a law. I don't care. The stronger we come at this from an Association, from a neighborhood, we have never watched signs.. let's be that neighborhood watch. Let's do that. The stronger we attack that the less those people will want to come here. But we do live in a different time. So we have to do this together is the best way to say that I think.
